

YOUTH DESIGN DAY Mapping Civic Learning Across Pittsburgh



Event Summary

On June 25th, the Civic Learning Ecosystem hosted a Youth Design Day at the SLB Youth Media Center within the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, bringing together youth leaders, educators, civic organizers, and community members from southwestern Pennsylvania. This event was a testament to the power of forging relationships across diverse groups to transform learning systems and experiences. Event attendees focused on the question:

"What would it take to create a map that ensures **every young person in Pittsburgh** can find the opportunities they need to feel powerful and seen?" Through listening sessions, youth testimonials, and collaborative mapping exercises, we sparked shared curiosity and reimagination. Led by young people, we initiated the creation of a comprehensive map of civic learning opportunities across Pittsburgh.

The Youth Design Day embodied our commitment to hosting convenings that build empathy, trust, and mutual care, helping to foster a learning ecosystem focused on civic readiness and human thriving.

Event Highlights

I) Young People Spoke. We Listened.

II) Mapping | Identifying and Categorizing What Exists

Creating a map of civic learning opportunities isn't just about listing places; it's about making sure those places are meaningful and accessible to young people.

Participants engaged in dynamic mapping to identify and categorize civic learning spaces both in and out of the classroom that are significant for youth engagement.


Central to the discussion was the importance of having youth-led and youth-centered spaces.

Once a robust list of places was created, the participants began to categorize and imagine how these civic opportunities would connect, and map together.

III) Imagining | Designing Solutions

The momentum generated at this event is driving student-created, innovative ideas that will pave the way for a more connected and youth-centered civic learning ecosystem in Pittsburgh. **Next steps include:**

- Follow-up Design Workshops: Planning additional workshops to further develop the proposed solutions.
- Data Collection and Analysis: Gathering and analyzing data from the event to inform future activities and program development.
- **Collaboration**: Maintaining Ongoing connections with event participants to momentum support sustain and the implementation of proposed solutions. Recruiting more voung people and stakeholders in the design process.
